Welcome to the <u>Grief-Sensitive Schools</u> (GSSI) network. The Grief-Sensitive Schools Initiative® (GSSI) is part of New York Life's nationwide effort to better equip educators and other school personnel to care for the grieving students. Through the program, trained New York Life ambassadors connect with schools in their local communities to offer a brief 20-minute presentation on the grief in schools and the dedicated resources available. School that receive this presentation and agree to strive to become Grief-Sensitive, may receive a small grant to support their efforts.

The GSSI program was developed to:

- raise awareness of the prevalence of children's bereavement;
- introduce the Coalition's industry-endorsed bereavement online resource and other bereavement resources;
- incentivize local schools/districts to raise awareness of both this issue and this resource in their school community; and
- to provide a systematic approach and program for Agents and Employees to engage with school communities as brand ambassadors and to foster deeper and more holistic relationships


Schools can join this initiative by:

Next steps for GSSI Schoools



Offer dedicated bereavement support training to your school community:

- Utilize one of the <u>pre-recorded videos</u> developed for educator training and:
 - either show during a staff meeting OR
 - assign to staff to view individually and discuss at a staff meeting
- Invite a <u>local bereavement center</u> or program to provide training during a professional development session or during a faculty meeting
- Ensure training for any new educators or school staff
- Provide more advanced training for your school mental health/pupil services professionals (e.g., school counselors, nurses, psychologists, and social workers)
- Offer a brief presentation to your parent organization

Access free resources:

- Order and/or download free resources
- Leverage resources with GSSI partners
- Partner with the local bereavement center as a referral and/or program partner
- Become familiar with resources and supports provided through the <u>National Center for School</u> Crisis and Bereavement
- Consider on-site peer support program for grieving students either conducted by school-based or community-based (e.g., from local bereavement center/program) professionals
- <u>Sign up for our newsletter</u> which highlights new and ongoing resources and tools, free webtnairsing plus more

Review school policies related to bereavement, including:

- Attendance policies that don't penalize students/staff for absences related to funerals and other mourning rituals
- · Faculty/staff bereavement leave benefits
- · Communications with families of deceased students
- Commemoration and memorialization, including considerations related to death by suicide and spontaneous memorials
- · Virtual memorials
- Graduation (e.g., granting posthumous degrees)
- · Recognition of students/staff who died in yearbook and other end of the year activities
- Limiting on-site funerals, wakes, and related services





GSSI schools and Bereavement Partners

The second book in the series, The Girl with the Locket, centers on a new experience for Kai, a bereavement camp. While he is somewhat anxious about the prospect of meeting new people, it doesn't take him long to make new friends. Elle is a young girl who struggles to talk about her own loss. Kai reaches out to her and finds that he has something to share with young people who are just like him.
